### Recognition...

Dr. Bill Baker (Associate Professor) had his research featured in articles in the Tampa Tribune and the USF Oracle in February, and the USF magazine (spring issue). The articles were about a compound he and his collaborators isolated from a marine tunicate that he obtained while diving in waters near Anvers Island. Antarctica. The compound, named Palmerolide A. was tested at National Cancer Institute and displayed positive effects on melanoma cells. Melanoma is said to be the most commonly diagnosed form of cancer in persons 25 to 29. The Baker group is studying the compound's mode of action -"why it kill melanoma cells and what the biochemistry is." Dr. Baker's research has been supported by grants from the National Science Foundation.

## The joy of our present, the hope of our future

Abuzar Kabir has been a graduate teaching assistant in Quantitative Analysis Laboratory and Methods Laboratory for several years. He has also held a position as a GC-MS analyst for several summers. He was born in Jessore, a small city in Bangladesh, and we asked him to tell more about himself:

"After finishing my high school education in Jessore, I moved to Dhaka, the country's capital, to begin my higher study. I enrolled into the University of Dhaka where I obtained my B.Sc. with honors and M.Sc. in Applied

Chemistry and Chemical Technology. I started my professional career in the Department of Applied Chemistry & Chemical Technology, University of Dhaka, Bangladesh as a lecturer in 1993 and was promoted to assistant professor in 1996. I left Bangladesh for higher education in 1999 and joined the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry, University of North Carolina at Greensboro, USA as a graduate student. I flew to Tampa on the first day of the new millennium to continue my higher study in the Department of Chemistry, University of South Florida. Later I joined Dr. Abdul Malik's research group and started my research on developing new sol-gel hybrid organic-inorganic material systems for chromatographic separation and analytical sample preparation. My research at USF has resulted in 8 publications in prestigious journals and 3 patents. I am planning to finish my Ph.D. work and graduate in May 2005."

He defended his dissertation on April 29.
